The life of Member and friend Brian Taylor was recently celebrated at the Waverton Coal Loader following his death after a lengthy period of ill health.

Rosemary has provided some information for the Probian and wishes us to remember Brain during this difficult time for the whole family.

'Brian's life was a full one. He was an educator with TAFE – Ryde Campus for many years and later with private providers.

Although Brian loved ships and the sea and worked in shipping in the UK, NZ and Australia he realised that his true calling was teaching. He was a lifelong teacher and learner, and left a legacy of immense worth in his care and consideration for his students. He spent many hours researching new approaches and perspectives in his lessons in order to better motivate and inspire his students to learn and grow, at TAFE NSW and while teaching in China. He enhanced the traditional teaching from textbooks with his own methods.

Brian enjoyed the act of critical thinking, reminding us that a silent retreat to an inner place where divergent thoughts could be sorted is a legitimate and positive activity.

Brian had a passion for education. It was the prism through which he viewed the world. I think he would agree with Albert Einstein who said:

"Life is like a piano
What you get out of it
Depends on how you play it."

From the Girl Guides Ski Club came the message:

"Brian has been an advocate for doing things in an alternative way and doing things the best way possible and an excellent educator".

Brian was a most willing and reliable dog walker, talker and dispenser of tasty titbits. Manu, the family dog, would willingly have attested to that. Manu loved Brian and the feeling was mutual. We're in this place today which Rosie, Brian and Manu visited together. Manu even 'rode the lift' such perfect trust did he have in his human family. Brian and Manu will walk together again when some of Brian's ashes are cast by the creek where he and Manu so often ventured.

A full life, one dedicated to many causes and a thorough gentleman – such sadness prevails but we will remember him in so many special ways.'

A final memory provided by Rosemary: "Brian would be pleased he beat the oncologist prediction by 4 days and put in a postal vote!!!"

A happy group of seven enjoyed a delicious lunch at the Greek Restaurant, Xenos in Crows Nest. From all accounts the food was delicious and plentiful, and it was delightful to be out and about on a lovely sunny day.

Naval Harbour Cruise

On a bright sunny Friday, 27 May, nine members and two guests of Lane Cove Probus joined the Naval Historical Society Sydney Harbour Cruise. Well positioned on the upper deck in the glorious sunshine, our group thoroughly enjoyed the outing onboard Bennelong.

The cruise itself visited various naval installations on HMAS Waterhen, Cockatoo Island, Spectacle Island and Snapper Island. These islands were viewed from the boat as we circumnavigated them. A Volunteer from the Naval Historical Society provided a very insightful history of the naval installations on all these beautiful little islands in the middle of Sydney Harbour. This cruise provided an opportunity to learn more about a selection of the Royal Australian Navy (RAN) activities and facilities in Sydney Harbour from 1788 to the present, especially during WW II.

During the cruise, the 78 guests onboard also learnt about some of the RAN customs and traditions.

The Cockatoo Island Dockyard built over 38 RAN ships and during WW II completed 31 major battle damage repairs to warships.

The Spectacle Island Armament Depot once held 1,000 tons of high explosive RAN ammunition and was central to resupply operations in Sydney. The Sea Cadet Company based on Snapper Island provided training for young boys and girls with many joining the RAN.

Following the three-hour adventure, the club members and guests then enjoyed a pleasant lunch on shore just to finish up what was a delightful and fun day out. Just one of the many things Lane Cove Probus members get to enjoy!!
